

If you Become a Victim of an Internet Fraud or Scam

- Change the password to whatever account was accessed by a third party. Also change the password to any other accounts that have that same password.
- If a credit card or bank account was accessed, call the company or the bank and have a fraud alert put on it; put a hold on all transactions.
- If you don't change your account numbers, keep an eye out, sometimes scam artists wait a couple of years or longer before using your information.

Internet Safety

With the number of computers connected to the Internet growing each day, Internet safety has become a hot topic of discussion. The Internet can be a great tool for children and adults, alike. However, many dangers (monetary, physical, and otherwise) lurk on the Internet waiting for unsuspecting users to download a virus or fill out a profile containing personal information that may be used against them. Simply knowing where you are on the net and where your information is going can make the Internet a much safer place.

- Never give out any personal information, such as your full name, address, and phone number.

Chat Rooms, Instant Messaging, and Online Dating

- Don't agree to meet online friends in person; if you do, arrange a meeting in a well-lit public area.



- Don't type or post anything that you wouldn't want your neighbor, boss, or family to find.

- Never agree to send or accept money, gifts, or anything to or from someone you meet online.


Email

- Don't open emails from people you don't know.
- 70% of internet crimes are initiated through email scams.
- Be wary of emails from reputable stores, eBay, Paypal, and other online sites asking you to update your profile. – Call the store or email the real website's help site before answering the email. It may be a scam known as Phishing.



Internet Safety Tip!!


Look for the Lock!



If you see a locked yellow lock in the bottom right corner, you know the site is encrypted, meaning that your personal information is secure.

Statistics

- The average age of a victim of Internet Crimes is 41.7 years old.
- 30.2% of Internet crime victims were over 50 years old.
- 64.3% of those who submit complaints of Internet crime are men; while only 35.7 are women.
- 59.8% of reported Internet crimes fall into the category of auction fraud.



Auctions

- Before bidding in an auction, review the seller's feedback. Check to see what negative and positive feedback has been given.



- Don't buy from sellers who have very few feedback comments.

- Don't send a check or money order, use an online service like Paypal. This will protect you against unauthorized purchases and help get your money back if you never receive the item.

Downloading

- Don't download images, movies or music unless you know the site is legitimate.

- Downloading is a good way to get a virus that may destroy your computer.



- Downloading music and movies without paying for them may be illegal and can lead to a fine of \$250,000 and up to 5 years in prison.
